EXPLAINING THIS ACTIVITY using the vocabulary from the 4 parts of Communication (video #1: https://voutu.be/3AYdHzUVmZY)

Metaphors and Symbols. Memes and Emojis. (Express meaning in multiple ways, express yourself; written communication, virtual spaces)

How does communication break down in this activity?

- If the sender or receiver doesn't have the same prior knowledge / cultural knowledge / language to encode / decode the message. (In other words, they may not get the joke, or the full meaning of the meme if they don't understand the context or the background info.)
- If you (sender) created a meme by choosing the image and accompanying text (message), the message might be unclear because there weren't enough clues in the text to get the joke across.
- The digital message might not make it to the receiver maybe they didn't open the text message / email. Maybe there was a sending failure...
- There isn't necessarily any feedback. When you (sender) forward a meme (message) to a friend (receiver), they may not respond (feedback) to let you know they got the message, or if they thought it was funny / appropriate. On the other hand, if you (sender) create a meme (message) that goes viral (feedback), you might feel quite good about yourself because you know the message is getting out there.

Strategies to improve communication:

- The person (sender) who sent the meme (message) to their friend (receiver) could ask for feedback to see what they thought.
- If the point of a meme is to make a comment about a situation (message), the creator of the meme (sender) might choose a different way to get the message across (i.e. talking, writing in words, non-verbal communication like a face-palm)



What is a metaphor? (slides 53-57)



In literature, we use metaphors and symbols.

In media literacy, we use memes and emojis.

A metaphor is a figure of speech that helps explain an idea.

- Comparing two things without using "like" or "as". (If you use "like" or "as", it would be a simile)
- States that one thing is (like) another thing not because they
 actually are the same, but for the sake of comparison or
 symbolism.
- Not literally true.



What does this sentence mean? "You are my sunshine"

Possible teacher prompts:

- Is this literally true?
- What is this sentence comparing?
- What do these things have in common?
- Are they actually the same thing?

Possible student answers:

- You are my sunshine is a metaphor:
 - It's comparing you / your personality to sunshine because both bring me joy and happiness.
 - You are not literally made of sunshine.

Remember, a metaphor is:

- A figure of speech that helps explain an idea.
- Compare two things without using "like" or "as"
- States that one thing is another thing not because they actually are the same, but for the sake of comparison or symbolism.
- Not literally true.

What is a symbol? (slides 61-63)



Teacher Prompt: What is a symbol... What does that symbol represent?

Possible student answers:

Flag, Emojis, Men / Women signs on bathroom, religious symbols, road signs, brands (i.e. Nike swoosh)

Minds on: Can a symbol have words?

A symbol is a thing that stands for something else

- A material object representing something else
- A dove represents peace
- A dog often stands for loyalty
- A flag can represent freedom... or oppression (depending on the point of view.)

Teacher Note:

- In this slideshow, we are using symbolism as an object that represents another object.
- However, a symbol can be more complex and represent a "second meaning"

Meanings and Second Meanings

For example: Your friend is a messy eater

- Simile: You say to your friend, "You eat like a pig!"
- Metaphor: You say to your friend, "You're a real pig!"
- Symbol: If you write a story about a pig—a pig that could also be understood as your friend—that could also be understood as a story about your friend—you have written a symbolic story.
 - The pig stands for your friend. Those who know your friend might recognize him or her, even with floppy ears and a curly tail.
 - Others might simply enjoy your story as the thrilling adventures of a pig.

In a story like that, the reader is meant to discover the second meaning.

- · A good example is Animal Farm by George Orwell.
- On one level, it is a story about animals on a farm.
- But it is also a story of life under an oppressive government.





How do we use memes to communicate?

Possible student answers:

- To share a joke
- It's funny
- It has something to do with your situation like it captures exactly how I feel!

Definition: A meme is something usually funny, copied and spread rapidly by Internet users - often with slight variations.

A meme is a metaphor because they express emotions indirectly

- You are comparing something in the text... to the emotion conveyed in the image
- They both have the same emotion
- But the kid is not related to studying for a test.

In this case, the "Success Kid" / "I hate sandcastles" meme shows a little kid with a balled up fist... It represents a feeling of triumph

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Lesson Plans

Memes as communication

"When you didn't studie for a test but you got an A anyway" is compared with the "success kid"

- · Both have a feeling of triumph
- They are not related objects

This just works on too many levels.

 Study had been misspelt as "studie" which is funny because usually when you study, you get things correct... and in this case, there was a spelling mistake.

A meme is not a symbol because the image does not universally represent the text on the meme.

 In this case, the kid does not universally represent triumph or doing well on a test.

Explain the Meme: Success Kid (slide 77)



- 1. Why is this funny?
 - It's a little kid saying "yes!"but they're too young to have to study for a test.
- 2. Identify the emotion.
 - Triumph! Yes! Happiness! I got away with this!
- 3. How does the text help you to interpret the meme?
 - The text tells you what the meme is about... in this case, about not having to study for a test and aceing it!
 - Normally, you'd do poorly if you didn't study, so the person is happy they beat the system. Yes!!!
- 4. What is the metaphor? (What comparison is the meme making?)
 - Comparing "Not studying for a test and getting a good mark" with a little kid looking serious and happy.
- 5. Teacher Prompt: "What do they have in common?"
 - They both are happy / triumph / Yes! I got away with this!

 - Over exaggerated fear to the point of silliness

 - Comparing you (bringing candy to school) with Jack Sparrow (when he gets chased by an angry mob.)
- Teacher Prompt: "What do they have in common?"
 - You both have something that everyone else wants
 - It's hyperbole (over exaggeration): people wouldn't really chase you in an angry hoard over candy, and yet ...



When you have the last slice of pizza vs Jack Being Chased...

- Why is this funny?
 - Over exaggerated fear to the point of silliness
 - Angry mob with spears doesn't happen, so it's comical
 - Has nothing to do with food, and yet it kind of does!
- Identify the emotion.
 - Comedic panic / everyone wants that last slice!
- 3. How does the text help you to interpret the meme?
 - The text tells you this meme is really making a comment about pizza and when you take the last slice...
 - When you take the last slice, it feels like everyone is mad because you took the last slice, and they wanted it... They're an angry hoard!
- 4. What is the metaphor? (What comparison is the meme making?)
 - Comparing "you taking the last slice of pizza" vs "Jack Sparrow being chased"
- 5. Teacher Prompt: "What do they have in common?"
 - You both have something that everyone else wants
 - It's hyperbole (over exaggeration): people wouldn't really chase you in an angry hoard over the last slice, and yet...

- Why is this funny?
 - Over exaggerated fear to the point of silliness
 - Angry mob with spears doesn't happen, so it's comical
 - Has nothing to do with school, and yet it kind of does!
- Identify the emotion.
 - (Comedic) panic / classmates are mad at you!
- How does the text help you to interpret the meme?
 - The text tells you this meme is really about your classmates being mad at you. (Not Jack Sparrow)
 - When you talk and get the class in trouble, everyone is mad because you got them in trouble... you have to run away! It's crazy!
- What is the metaphor? (What comparison is the meme making?)
 - Comparing you (when you got the class in trouble) with Jack Sparrow (when he gets chased by an angry mob)
- Teacher Prompt: "What do they have in common?"
 - They both are about people being angry with you!
 - Hyperbole (over-exaggeration) ... your classmates aren't really like an angry mob, but it feels like it.

- Why is this funny?
 - A grumpy cat is funny because cats are normally cute...
 - This doesn't have anything to do with teamwork, and teamwork is supposed to be really positive (at school), but this cat is grumpy (the opposite)... so that makes it funny
- Identify the emotion.
 - Grumpy / grouchy / irritable / You don't want to do this.
- 3. How does the text help you to interpret the meme?
 - The text tells you this is about teamwork (and not cats)
 - Maybe you've talked about other acronyms for team:
 Together Everyone Accomplishes More
 - Instead of accomplishing more... everyone annoys you.
 - Being forced to like teamwork is irritating. So having to work in a team makes you grumpy like the cat...
- 4. What is the metaphor? (What comparison is the meme making?)
 - Comparing "TEAM" acronyms with grumpy cat
- Teacher Prompt: "What do they have in common?"
 - They're both about grumpy things that irritate you.
 - Teamwork initiatives irritate you.



"When I realize it's Monday"... vs Grumpy Cat...

- . Why is this funny?
 - A grumpy cat is funny because cats are normally cute...
 - This doesn't have anything to do with Monday... but it's true. Mondays make me grumpy.
- Identify the emotion.
 - Grumpy / grouchy / irritable / You don't want to do this.
- 3. How does the text help you to interpret the meme?
 - The text tells you this is about Monday (and not cats)
 - Mondays are hard because everyone has to go back to school / work after a good weekend.
 - So this meme captures how I feel on Monday.
- 4. What is the metaphor? (What comparison is the meme making?)
 - Comparing how I feel (when I realize it's Monday) with grumpy cats.
- Teacher Prompt: "What do they have in common?"
 - They're both about grumpy things that irritate you.

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
