- 3. Two of the guests are underprivileged youth from the local Newark community. The other two guests are police officers from precincts throughout Newark.
- 4. Subban knows that these two walks of life sometimes have very different experiences and sometimes have very different perspectives of each other. He chatted about this during an interview with Lisa Marie Latino, executive producer and host of Hip New Jersey.
- 5. "Anybody that's grown up in inner-city understands that law enforcement can be perceived in different ways."
- 6. On the other hand, his best friend was a police officer. So Subban is well aware that law enforcement can be a difficult and dangerous career with its own challenges.
- 7. In a time of rising tension and people demanding change from the status quo, PK Subban came up with his Blueline Buddies program when he played for the Nashville Predators. Now that he's playing for the New Jersey Devils, Subban is continuing the program in his new home.
- 8. "I'm all for athletes and people in general exercising their rights... I'm making an effort to build a bridge. Trying to create positive energy between police officers that leave their houses every day, leave their families every day and don't know if they're going to come back, and our underprivileged youth."
- 9. In many ways, this is about opportunity and creating opportunity.
- 10. "I know that I have the opportunity to purchase 4 tickets to a home game, 41 times. Who sits in those seats, that's up to me. And I chose to have 2 underprivileged children that don't have the opportunity

and two police officers that have the opportunity now to mingle with underprivileged kids who may have only ever seen cops in a bad light."

- 11. Of course, eating one dinner together and watching one game won't fix all of the real world problems that we face today during tumultuous times. But it is an opportunity to start a conversation.
- 12. D'Angelo Bennett, his son and his nephew participated in Subban's Blueline Buddies in Tennessee where they had an opportunity to interact with local police officers within this fun context. Later on, Bennett described the experinece to Joe Rexrode, sports columnist with the Tennessean.
- "The boys haven't stopped talking about this and I think they will look at things differently from now on. Even me, I'm 41, I've never sat down and had a conversation with a police officer before. Hell, it changed my view."
- 14. Blueline Buddies is also creating positive impressions on some of the police officers as well. Subban was interviewed on the Daily Show with Trevor Noah where he described an email his team received from a participating officer.
- 15. "I'm going to stay in touch with this kid... we're going to go to many more games because I got season tickets..."


