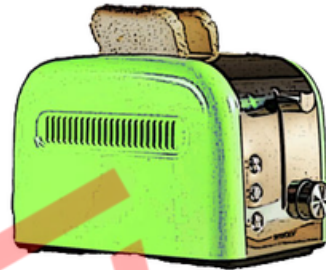

1. When the weather gets colder, people want to warm up. They turn on car seat warmers. People huddle beside space heaters. Some of us snuggle under electric blankets. Little do people know that they might be literally toasting their skin.
2. Erythema ab igne is a skin condition. Constant heat at a low level or infrared radiation causes this problem. People call this Toasted Skin Syndrome.
3. Today, many houses have central heating. But in the past, people spent a lot of time warming up in front of the fireplace. The heat from the fireplace might have resulted in this skin discoloration. Today, other heat sources often cause Toasted Skin Syndrome. For example, the laptop you sit with for hours makes a lot of heat.
4. Erythema ab igne is the medical term. It comes from Latin. It means "Erythema From Fire." Erythema is unusual skin redness. In this case, too much heat causes blood vessels in your skin to widen. In Toasted Skin Syndrome, constant heat exposure can change how your skin looks. The heat could result in a mildly pink pattern. Sometimes, it looks like a darker web-like pattern on the skin.
5. The usual treatment is to remove the heat. Advanced cases of skin damage may last for years or even forever. However, most mild cases go away in a few months.
6. Most of us have options. We can choose to move the space heater further away. The laptop can be placed on a desk. The heated car seat can be turned off once we've warmed up. But, not all of us have the luxury to do without heat.
7. Sam is a 21-year-old in New Zealand. She educates people on TikTok about mental health. Sam talks about living with Borderline Personality Disorder. She shares her life with the TikTok community. Of course, people are naturally curious and ask questions. Sometimes, the questions have nothing to do with her mental health. Instead, people ask about her physical health.

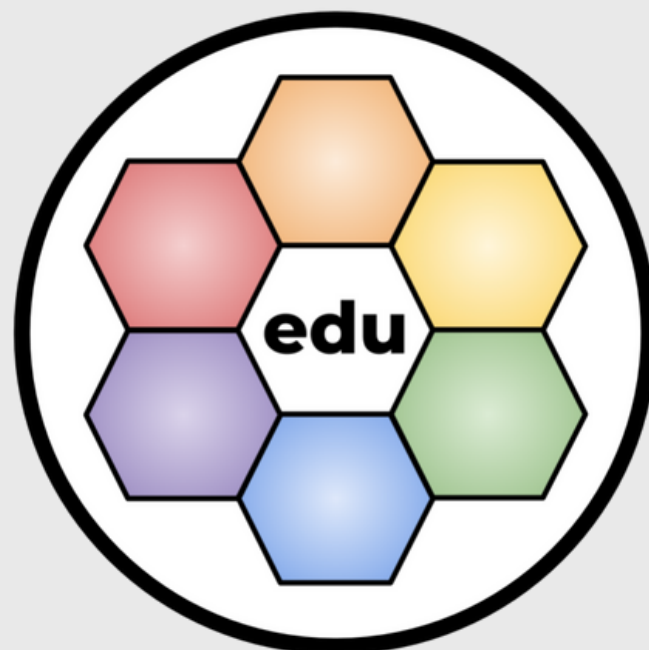
I made this product consistent with my other Single PDF format files.
